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

## **Parents** limbo

FRUSTRATED WA parents are demanding answers over the State Government's long-running proposal to move Year 7s into public high

The incoming president of the state's peak parent group, Kylie Catto, said delays over the decision and a lack of consultation was causing angst among parents.

Education Minister Liz Constable mooted the idea in 2009 and told parliament in October last year that a decision would be made "in the next

"All the surveys show 65 to 70 per ent are not in favour of it and I think hat's because they don't know what will entail and we haven't been told that the educational benefit is for

Ms Catto, who took over as president of the WA Council of State School Organisations last week, said one of her first priorities would be requesting a meeting with the minister.

The Government has been under pressure by the State Opposition to end the uncertainty, but Premier Colin Barnett said he would be making no apologies for the delay because it was an important and complex change to WA's education

"I would hope over coming months, the Government, on the advice of the Minister for Education, will make a decision as to the policy, the timing and the costings," Mr Barnett told parliament.

"I am not putting any timing on it, it is a big decision. We are looking at it."

Ms Catto took over from outgoing president Rob Fry last week and heads up 600 parents and citizens groups around the state.

As well as addressing parent concerns over the Year 7 review, she said her focus would be making sure teachers were well-equipped and ensuring parents stayed focused on their children's education.

Ms Catto, a member of WACSSO for II years, said parents needed to take a greater responsibility for their children's behaviour and make sure they were being taught manners at home.

"It's my job to teach my kids to be good citizens and then they go to school to get a good education and hopefully be good, active citizens while they're there," she said.

Man dies in fall

POLICE want to speak with anyone who saw a man fall to his death at a gorge near Tom Price yesterday while trying to save his son.

Christopher Mark Majewski, 3l, of Leinster, was hiking with his son along Dales Gorge in Karijini National Park, about 1500km north of Perth, when the boy tumbled down an embankment near Fortescue Falls.

Mr Majewski, principal of Leinster Primary School since 2009, fell as he tried to reach his son. Rescue crews rushed to the scene but he was dead by the time they arrived.

The boy suffered serious injuries and was flown to Perth where a Princess Margaret Hospital spokeswoman this morning said his condition was critical.

A HEAVILY drugged Michael Jackson said he loved children and felt their pain because "I didn't have a childhood", adding "I hurt", in a harrowing recording played in court to Wednesday.

In a phone conversation recorded just weeks before his death in June 2009, the pop icon also said he wanted planned comeback shows in London to be better than The Beatles or Elvis.

In the semi-incoherent exchange ith his doctor Conrad Murray, who

is on trial charged with the man-slaughter of Jackson, the star talked about establishing a Michael Jackson Children's Hospital with money from the comeback shows.

"Elvis didn't do it. Beatles didn't do it. We have to be phenomenal," he said, adding that fans should leave his shows saying "I've never seen nothing like this in my life ... He's the greatest entertainer in the world."

After Dr Murray replied, "I know you would", Jackson continued: "I want to do that for them. That will be remembered more than my performances. My performances will be up there helping my children and always

"I love them. I love them because I didn't have a childhood. I had no childhood. I feel their pain. I feel their hurt. I can deal with it."

Dr Murray is accused of giving Jackson a sedative overdose while trying to help him sleep at his LA mansion.

# Genius who changed our world

The former chief executive has died at the age of 56, losing a long battle with pancreatic cancer.

Apple released a statement this morning confirming Mr Jobs' death, and prompting a flood of moving tributes around the world.

Social networking sites lit up with messages, and Twitter was dominated by talk about the tech

Many said they learnt of Mr obs' death while using a device he evented, a point made by US resident Barack Obama in his

Mr Jobs had an operation for pancreatic cancer in 2004 and a liver transplant in 2009, and remained with Apple as chairman of the board of directors.

He is survived by his widow, Laurene Powell, and four children. His family said Mr Jobs died "peacefully" and they thanked those who had supported them during his fight with cancer over the past year.

"In his public life, Steve was own as a visionary. In his private own as a visionary. In his private e, he cherished his family," a mily statement said.
"We are thankful to the many sople who have shared their ishes and prayers during the last ishes and memories."

its statement earlier today, said: "We are deeply sadto announce that Steve Jobs d away today.

"Steve's brilliance, passion and energy were the source of countless innovations that enrich and improve all of our lives. The world is immeasurably better because of course."

"His greatest love was for his wife, Laurene, and his family. Our hearts go out to them and to all who were touched by his extraordinary gifts."

Mr Jobs resigned as Apple chief executive officer in August, with Tim Cook named as his successor. As news of his death broke, Apple.com turned its home page into a tribute to Mr Jobs, posting a large black-and-white photo of the visionary leader.

The photo showed Jobs in his trademark black turtleneck and small round glasses. The caption read "Steve Jobs, 1955-2011".

He said Mr Jobs was brave enough to think differently, bold enough to believe he could change the world, and talented enough to do it.

"There may be no greater tribute to Steve's success than the fact that much of the world learnt of his passing on a device he invented," Mr Obama wrote on Twitter.

Microsoft boss Bill Gates said it had been "an insanely great

honour" to know him. "Steve and I first met nearly 30 years ago, and have been colleagues, competitors and friends over the course of more than half our lives," Mr Gates said. He was "truly saddened" to learn of his death.

"The world rarely sees someone who has had the profound impact Steve has had, the effects of which will be felt for many generations to come." Fellow technology leaders, Facebook founder Mark Zuck-erberg and Google chief Larry

The industry icon emerged briefly in March to unveil the iPad 2. His death comes just one day after Apple unveiled the new iPhone 4S.

### 10 THAT TEVE JOBS' PRODUCTS DEFINED

STEVE Jobs had no formal schooling in engineering, yet he's listed as the inventor or co-inventor on more than 200 US patents. These are some of the significant products that were created under his direction:

Apple I (1976) - Apple's first product was a computer for hobbyists and engineers, a computer for hobbyists and engineers, made in small numbers. Steve Wozniak designed it, while Jobs orchestrated the funding and handled the marketing.

Apple II (1977) - One of the first successful personal computers, the Apple II was designed as a mass-market product. It was still largely Wozniak's design. Several upgrades for the model followed, and the product line continued until 1993.

iPod (2001) - It wasn't the first digital music player with a hard drive, but it was the first successful one. Apple's expansion into portable electronics has had vast ramifications. The iPod's success prepared the way for the iTunes music store and the iPhone.

iTunes store (2003) - Before the iTunes store, buying digital music was a hassle, making piracy the more popular option. he store simplified the process and brought ogether tracks from all the major labels. The tore became the biggest music retailer in the US

phone (2007) - The iPhone did for the phone experience what the Macintosh did for personal computing, making the power of a smartphone easy to harness. Apple is now the world's most profitable maker of phones, and the influence of the iPhone is evident in all

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
