The remarks occurred during Mr Jones' 50-minute speech at the annual \$100-per-head Sydney University Liberal Club President's Dinner, on the top floor of Sydney's Waterfront restaurant in The Rocks last Saturday.



Digital generation struggles to switch off

"I have had a computer since! was about four and now I use did's old laptop, an IPod and mum's IPad, which I bechnically use more than she does," he says.

"It is really up to mums to keep track of the time and that is where it becomes magnity because if I've got a deadline, Sieve is not here and I can't get a play date in the school holidays, then it sometimes can become a babysitter".

While Mrs Brossman's time-keeping might be furly lax, her attitude to protecting Hunter from

adult content online is stringent.

"Some of these games sites cater for young kids but they also eater to older kids and that totally worries me and so, that is why he is only allowed to play pre-downloaded games on the laptop and IPad, and is not allowed on YouTube without me being in the room.

"I am very strict with what he is allowed to play and he knows that if he does one thing wrong that I see them he just loses rights to that".

HUNDREDS of children are seeking

HUNDREDS of children are seeking crisis counselling every month after having sexually explicit images of them or their friends sent out via the internet or mobile phone.

Figures from the Kids Helpline reveal children as young as 10 are increasingly turning to the free counselling service to cope with the trend. The group's data suggests that between January and March this year about 500 counselling sessions were offered to children who called with "sexting-related concerns".

A survey by the organisation also found that of about 1500 children, about 40 per cent admitted to being involved in sexting behaviour. Experts admit the survey is just the tip of the tesberg.

involved in sexting behaviour. Experts admit the survey is just the tip of the iceberg.

John Daigleish, the strategy and research manager of BoysTown, which runs Klds Helpline, said: "For some young people, [sexting] is having a very significant impact on their emotional wellheing. We need to look at better ways of diverting them from that behaviour, and educating and supporting them in relation to the risks involved."

Laws designed to target adults who sexually exploit children also apply to interactions between young people, such as the sending of explicit images using a phone or the internet.

In a submission to a Victorian parlamentary inquiry, the Victorian child affect of the laws were poorly suited to addressing issues arising from sexting and should be changed.



A list of advertisers on 2GB was being circulated, with calls for those companies to boycott the Jones's companies to boycott the Jones's comments were recorded at a \$100-s-head Sydney University. Liberal Club President's dinner held at the Waterfront Restaurant at The Rocks last Saturday. The club twested the next day. "Brilliant speech by Alan Jones last night. It's no wonder he is the nation's most influential broadcaster."

Attendees at the function were

running for cover last night, with two leading Liberal Party membe telling *The Sun-Herald* they had not heard the comments, despite listening to Jones's entire 50-minute speech

State Liberal MP Ray Williams State Liberal MP Ray Williams told The Sun-Heruld: "It was a loud room and a long speech. I recall Julia Gillard being mentioned but not John Gillard."

Young Liberal President Simon Fontam, a staffer for Community Services Minister Pru Goward, also insisted he did not hear any claim that John Gillard had died of shaine. He said last night he had listened to the entire speech but did not hear any thing about Mr Gillard's death.

Last year, Jones said of Ms Gillard: "In putting her into a chaff

bag and hoisting her into the Tas-

man Sea." Jones has also claimed her beha viour in imposing the carbon price "borders on the treasonous", and has agreed with one of his callers regarding Ms Gillard: "Yeah, that's

regarding Ms Gillard: "Yeah, that's it. Bring back the guillotine!" Mr Gillard, 83, whom the Prime Minister described as her "inspiration" died in Adelaide this month after a long lilness. "Above all, he taught me to love learning and to understand its power to change lives." Ms Gillard said. "He always regretted his family background meant he had not proceeded on to higher aducation as a young man. He was determined that I had the opportunities he was denied. It has become apparent to my client in recent months that *The Sun-Herald* is using material from *The Sunday Telegraph* without authorisation or attribution.

On 16 January 2011, my client published on the front page of *The Sunday Telegraph* a photograph of Jesse, a four-year-old boy who was swept from the arms of a rescuer trying to free a family from raging floodwaters in Queensland. The photograph had been provided exclusively to *The Sunday Telegraph* by Jesse's father. A copy of the photograph is attached hereto and marked Annexure A.

The same photograph of Jesse appeared on page 7 of the later editions of *The Sun-Herald* on 16 January 2011, but not in the first edition, in a spread entitled "The faces of tragedy". A copy of page 7 of *The Sun-Herald* is attached hereto and marked Annexure B.

Also on 16 January 2011, my client published on page 17 of *The Sunday Telegraph* an exclusive interview with Matthew Newton by Ros Reines, entitled "Newton's recovery on track", a copy of which is attached and marked Annexure C. The interview included the following statements:

- "Working out was part of the therapy there."
- "It was something I did most days there."
- "My first priority is just to get healthy. I want to eat right, exercise, continue my therapy as an outpatient and just try and get back on an even keel."

I am instructed that each of the passages underlined above, as well as other sections of the Ros Reines article, were substantially reproduced in the article entitled "Newton gives image a work-out" which was published in the later editions – but not in the first edition - of *The Sun-Herald* on 16 January 2011 under the byline of Sarah Whyte. A copy of the Sarah Whyte article is attached hereto and marked Annexure D.

The front page picture of Jesse and the Newton material clearly constitute substantive parts of my client's publication. They were published in *The Sun-Herald* without a licence, without any acknowledgement of my client's copyright, and, in relation to the Newton material, with a misleading and deceptive statement claiming that authorship rights in the Newton material belonged to Sarah Whyte.

In the circumstances, the reproduction of the front page picture of Jesse and the Newton material in *The Sun-Herald* on 16 January 2011 is a flagrant and indefensible breach of my client's valuable copyright. This is just one of several editions of *The Sun-Herald* in which material from *The Sunday Telegraph* has been reproduced without acknowledgement.

My client demands that *The Sun-Herald* immediately cease any and all use of material belonging to *The Sunday Telegraph*, and provide us with a written undertaking that *The Sun-Herald* will no longer use material belonging to *The Sunday Telegraph* without a license or sufficient acknowledgement of my client's copyright.

My client reserves all rights with respect to this infringement.

In the circumstances, the reproduction of the Newton material in *The Sun-Herald* on 16 January 2011 is a flagrant and indefensible breach of my client's valuable copyright.

My client demands that you immediately cease any and all use of material belonging to *The Sunday Telegraph*, and provide us with a written undertaking that you will no longer use material belonging to *The Sunday Telegraph* without a license or sufficient acknowledgement of my client's copyright.

My client reserves all rights with respect to this infringement.
